Brenda Evril Langford Billingy was born on the Island of Trinidad, West Indies, the youngest of eight children born to Gladys and Lenny Langford. She received a pre-professional degree from Caribbean Union College at 18 years of age and then migrated to the United States where she completed her B.A. degree in Psychology from Columbia Union College and an M.A. degree in Education from Howard University.

In 1995, Brenda was ordained as a local Elder and her life began to change dramatically. Serving in that capacity allowed her to discover the unique

gifts that God has graciously bestowed upon her—especially the gift of speech, counseling, and encouragement. It was then that she made a promise to the Lord that when her children enrolled in college, she would devote all of her time and attention to His purpose for her life. This decision led her to return to Columbia Union College in 1998 to complete a B.A. degree in Religion. Upon graduation, she was hired by the Allegheny East Conference as the associate pastor of the Metropolitan SDA Church in Hyattsville, Maryland. Chaplain (Brigadier General) Andrew R. Harewood is the Deputy Chief of Chaplains, U.S. Army Reserve, and the Director of Strategy, Plans, Policy, Resources and Soldier/Family Spiritual Readiness (SPPRS) at the Office of the Chief of Chaplains (OCCH), The Pentagon. Chaplain Harewood serves as the authoritative advisor to the Chief of Chaplains (CCH) in leading a branch of 5,866 Active Duty Chaplains in delivering Total Army Soldier-

focused Religious Support (RS).

Chaplain Harewood first enlisted in the U.S. Army as a chaplain assistant in 1990. Following five years of service, he completed both master's and doctoral degrees at Howard University, Washington, D.C. He is the Howard University 1995 recipient of the Henry G. Maynard Scholastic Award.

Chaplain Harewood is a graduate of numerous leadership courses. He also holds certifications in Theology, Clinical Pastoral Education, Trauma Counseling, Crisis Management/Intervention, Mental Health Counseling, and Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training among others.

Chaplain Harewood's military awards and decorations include Joint Meritorious Unit Award, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Army Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal, NATO Medal, Military Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, and numerous citations from the White House, Pennsylvania Senate, and various other civic and denomination awards.

Chaplain Harewood is married to Karen Annette, a medical doctor. They have four sons; Andrew, Jason, Aaren, and Jalon. His hobbies include reading, distance running, billiards, scuba diving, and devising creative and educational methods of comprehensive leadership. Andrew's life motto is, "Don't tell me, show me!"



DR. RICHARD HART SUNDAY, OCTOBER 29, 2023

Dr. Richard Hart currently serves as President of Loma Linda University Health – the umbrella corporation that includes the enterprise's academic, healthcare, and research organizations. He earned his Doctor of Medicine degree from LLU School of Medicine in 1970, followed by a Doctor of Public Health in International Health at Johns Hopkins University in 1977, also becoming Board certified in Preventive Medicine.

Dr. Hart has served Loma Linda University since 1972 in a variety of ways that include Chair of the School of Public Health's Department of Health Sciences, Director of the Center for Health Promotion, Chair of the School of Medicine's Department of Preventive Medicine, Dean of the School of Public Health, and President (previously Chancellor) and CEO of the University.

Dr. Hart's vision extends beyond the walls of Loma Linda University not only to the local communities, but also to the villages and towns, the hospitals and mission clinics, in the farthest reaches of our globe. He has served as Chief of Party for a USAID project in Tanzania where he developed a national maternal and child health program that is still a model for Africa today. His passion for humanitarian service has led to the development of a variety of programs at Loma Linda University including, Students for International Mission Service (SIMS) and Social Action Community Health System (SACHS)-a local low-cost clinic for the medically underserved; and more recently, to the establishment of the San Manuel Gateway College, part of LLU's San Bernardino Campus.

Dr. Hart also serves as president of Adventist Health International (AHI), a management corporation established to restore Adventist mission hospitals worldwide.

PAUL LLEWELLYN

Paul Llewellyn is the president of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada, and hails from lovely Prince Edward Island (PEI). He grew up in a military household and was thankful to see God slowly bring his whole family to know Jesus.

ANDREA LUXTON

Andrea Luxton has served as associate director for higher education at the North American Division since July 2023. Luxton began her career in education in 1982 as head of the English Department for Stanborough School in England, her home country. After spending four years at Catholic University in Washington, D.C., as both a student and part-time teaching assistant and lecturer, she returned to England to chair the English

Department at Newbold College from 1986–1991.

Beginning in 1991, she held multiple responsibilities as education director, Sabbath School director, and women's ministries coordinator of the British Union of Seventh-day Adventists. In 1993, Luxton returned to her roots at Stanborough, this time as principal. She remained there until 1997, at which time she became president of Newbold College, England. In 2001, Luxton relocated to Canada where she served as vice-president for academic administration at Canadian University College (now Burman University) in Lacombe, Alberta, from 2001–2003. She served as associate director of education for the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists from 2003–2006, during which time she was also the executive secretary of the Adventist Accrediting Association. In 2006, Luxton accepted the role of president of Canadian University College. She served in that capacity until her transition to Andrews University as provost in 2010, and then as president in 2016. She retired from Andrews University in 2023 and accepted a part-time role as associate director, higher education at the North American Division in July 2023.

Luxton received a B.A. degree in Theology and English from Newbold College, an MA in English from Andrews University, a PhD in English from Catholic University of America, and a Postgraduate Diploma in Institutional Management and Change in Higher Education from the University of Twente, Netherlands.

Luxton has written a number of articles for professional and church publications, often using these mediums as a way of connecting her passions for literature, education, and the life of faith. She is also an experienced international speaker both in and outside of Church audiences. Her hobbies include reading world literature, walking by the ocean, and traveling to remote destinations.



Introduction

God has called the Seventh-day Adventist Church to a prophetic mission and redemptive message of Scripture, as declared by the Three Angels of Revelation 14:6-12. The Holy Spirit empowers and directs the Church in fulfilling this mission and proclaiming this message. - 2.1 Acceptance and practice of Bible-based, Christ-centered beliefs with special emphases on the Church's characteristic and unique doctrines,⁹ which point to a loving, gracious God
- 2.2 Understanding, experience, and sharing of the joy of forgiveness (justification) and holiness (sanctification) through the power (righteousness) of Christ
- 2.3 Understanding and practice of a biblically based wholistic lifestyle¹⁰ that expresses our relationship with Christ and invites all others to God's abundant life
- 2.4 Knowledge and affirmation of Adventist identity and the Lord's leading throughout Adventist history¹¹

MISSION FOR ALL

Equipped and empowered by the Holy Spirit, ¹⁹ Seventh-day Adventist members and church entities are engaged in personal and public proclamation of "the everlasting gospel... to every nation, tribe, language, and people" (Rev. 14:6, NASB). The Great Commission to make disciples²⁰ requires creative and modern means while remaining true to Christ's incarnational²¹ and wholistic approach to mission. ²² Christ mingled, showed sympathy, ministered to needs, won confidence, then invited people to follow Him. ²³ The goal is to lead people to Christ and invite them to unite with the Seventh-day Adventist Church as disciples of Christ who make disciples.

B 55 RESPONSIBILITY AND RELATIONSHIP OF OFFICERS—POLICY AMENDMENT

RECOMMENDED, To amend B 55, Responsibility and Relationship of Officers, to read as follows:

B 55 Responsibility and Relationship of Officers

B 55 05 Union Conference/Mission Officers—In order to preserve the unity of the worldwide work, union conferences and union missions are expected to maintain close counsel with the division offices. Fields which during emergency conditions may be temporarily detached from the division organizations shall maintain close counsel directly with the General Conference.

B 55 10 Union Conference President—The union conference president, <u>elected by the union</u>, is a member of the division committee and is the division representative in the conduct of the work in the union to which he has been elected. He shall, together with the union committee, supervise and carry forward the work in the union.

<u>B 55 15 16 Local Conference President</u>—The local conference president, elected by the conference, is a member of the union committee and is the union representative in the conduct of the work in the local conference to which he has been elected. He shall, with the local conference committee, supervise and carry forward the work in the local conference.

B 55 15 16 Local Conference/Mission/Field President—The local conference/mission/field president, appointed by the union, is a member of the union committee and is the union representative in the conduct of the work in the local conference/mission/field to which he has been appointed. He shall, with the local conference/mission/field committee, supervise and carry forward the work in the local conference/mission/field.

B 55 20 Newly Elected Officers of Conferences/Missions/Fields

Fields to Receive Training—Union conferences/missions shall be responsible to arrange for appropriate executive training for newly elected officers of conferences/missions/fields.

B 55 25 Committee Membership of Officers—1. Members Ex Officio of Lower Organizations—The officers of higher organizations are members ex officio of the executive committees of lower organizations. Any such officers may attend executive committee meetings of the lower organizations; however, those exercising their voting rights at any one meeting shall not make up more than ten percent of the committee membership present. A spirit of close cooperation shall always be maintained between the lower and the higher organizations, and officers of the lower organizations shall secure counsel from the officers of the higher organization on all major matters and policies affecting the work of their respective fields.

General Conference and <u>Division North American Division</u> Committee Membership—<u>Each The North American dDivision</u> committee is a section of the General Conference Executive Committee; therefore, any members of the General Conference Executive Committee who are available are members of any and the North American dDivision committee.

BA 73 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY—NEW POLICY

RECOMMENDED, To adopt new policy, BA 73 Information Technology, to read as follows:

BA 73 Information Technology

BA 73 05 Philosophy, Background, and Objectives --- Technology is an integral part of the life of a denominational organization. Information Technology (IT) resources shall be used strategically to maximize the mission of the Church. Every organization has a unique set of risks, priorities, and constantly evolving technology needs; thus, organizations must plan for IT governance, data security, data privacy, policies and procedures.

BA 73 09 Information Technology Governance --- Organizational officers are responsible for all areas of IT operations, including its policies and procedures to ensure that the organization's IT priorities are balanced with focus on mission, resources are provided, and risks are managed.

BA 73 10 Data Security --- It is recommended that organizations implement data classification processes along with technical and organizational measures to enable Confidentiality, Integrity and Availability of sensitive data to protect it from being compromised and keep the reputation of the church from being adversely impacted, and the mission of the church from being interrupted.

BA 73 12 Technical Standards Committee --- A committee of the North American Division called the Technical Standards Committee (TSC) shall be responsible for the development and management of division-wide IT standardization guidelines and best practices. The TSC shall have the ability to create ad-hoc sub-committees as needed. For details regarding membership and terms of reference, see NAD Secretariat.

 BA 73 15 Policies and Procedures --- Organizations shall establish and implement IT policies and procedures in compliance with applicable rules and regulations within the organization's jurisdiction. TSC shall actively maintain IT policy templates that can be used by organizations to accomplish their IT goals. It is recommended that organizations implement the core IT policies as recommended by TSC.

BA 73 25 Standardization --- TSC is responsible for developing, maintaining, and continued revision of the TSC IT standardization guidelines document. These IT standardization guidelines will focus on how organizations can effectively and efficiently accomplish current best practices as recommended by the IT industry, adapted to our church practices, structure and needs. Organizations that adopt these standards will better position themselves to:

- Comply with regulations.
- Enhance our cyber security and privacy posture.
- Achieve compliance with cyber insurance requirements and lower premiums costs.
- Take advantage of economies of scale.

- Run more efficient IT departments.
- Improve synergy among organizations within the division, by being part of a network of professionals that share the same standards (policies, processes, software and equipment).
- Recruit and develop IT professionals.
- Improve business and ministry continuity objectives.

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7 BA 73 30 Union IT Role --- Each union shall have an IT director, or at least assign the role of IT

- 8 coordinator to an employee of the organization, who will participate in the development,
- 9 maintenance, and continued revision of the TSC IT standardization guidelines document. The
- 10 Union IT director, or the IT Coordinator, in coordination with the Union administration, will be
- 11 <u>responsible for implementing and maintaining adherence to the TSC IT standardization</u>

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L 28 Ministerial Seminary Sponsorship Plan

- L 28 05 Purpose of the Plan—The Ministerial Seminary Sponsorship Plan has been devised to assist individuals and their employing conferences in meeting their educational requirements for the gospel ministry through subsidies provided by the North American Division, the union, and the sponsoring conference.
- 14 L 28 10 Definition of 'Ministerial 'Seminary Sponsorship'— 'Ministerial 'Seminary
- Sponsorship' as used here provides <u>36 months of financial assistance support</u> to those sponsored
- by conferences or church institutions toward obtaining the degree of Master of Divinity at the
- 17 Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary. By sponsoring a student, the conference or
- 18 church institution does not obligate itself to employ the sponsored student after graduation.
- 19 However, a sponsorship does require the sponsoring conference to provide financial support to
- the sponsored students for the duration of the sponsorship for seminary and living expenses as described below.
- L 28 15 Review of Sponsorship—Sponsorships shall be granted only to full-time students who maintain a satisfactory standing at the Seminary. The recipient shall be appointed to full-time study for a year and, if judged to have done successful work during that period, the sponsorship shall be continued allowing the student to complete the Master of Divinity degree.
 - L 28 20 Number of Sponsorships—The number of ministerial sponsorships to be granted each year shall be determined by NADCOM at the Year end Meeting. based on approval of the North American Division budget as presented to the Year-end Meeting.

L 28 25 Partial Sponsorships –

RECOMMENDED, To approve Y 23 05 Moving Allowance—Policy Amendment to read as follows:

Y 23 Moving Allowance

- Y 23 05 Employee Moving Allowances—1. Assistance—When an employee is requested by an employing organization to move to a new location or a person is being called into denominational service, the employer may provide the following assistance:
- a. An amount to cover freight/van charges and insurance up to maximums established by the employer.
- b. Travel expense and a per diem as per current policy and 100 percent of the regular mileage allowance to move the employee's car or up to two cars for employee and spouse to the new field of employment.
- c. A flat amount rounded up to the nearest \$10 to cover packing and other moving costs at 33 percent of the remuneration factor.
- d. Automobile Registration and Excise Tax—Employees who are called to another state or province/territory and who are required to pay duplicate excise tax/sales tax, license, and certification/inspection fees may report such expense on one car if they register their car within 90 days of moving to the new area. If the employee has a spouse, the above expenses may also be reported on a second car.
- 2. Maximum Assistance—The allowances referred to in b., c., and d. shall be limited to two vehicles and two one flat moving allowances (33 percent of the remuneration factor) per family even though both spouses are denominationally employed.
- 3. Sharing Moving Expenses—When calls are extended to a husband and wife to join two different denominational institutional organizations in the same area, the cost of moving shall be shared by the calling organizations. However, when the initial call is for one spouse and the other spouse obtains employment, the organization that initiates the primary call shall be responsible for the full cost of the move.
- 4. Tax Impact. Law Changes for 2018 With the tax law changes in 2018 in the United States, making all of the moving expenses/reimbursements taxable, the The employing organization may offer up to 35% for the tax assistance on the total allowable moving expense to cover the additional taxes due from the employee move. This is retroactive to January 1, 2018. This policy would also apply to the sponsored seminary students and retiring employees.

Y 29 15 AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE ASSISTANCE—POLICY AMENDMENT

RECOMMENDED, To amend Y 29 15 Automobile Insurance Assistance, to read as follows:

Y 29 15 Automobile Insurance Assistance—

1. Eligibility

- a. Those eligible for automobile insurance assistance shall be <u>full time</u>, <u>denominational</u> employees <u>in the</u> <u>of the General Conference</u>, <u>General Conference and</u> North American Division <u>with assistance available for a maximum of two cars per household.</u> <u>institutions</u>, <u>union conferences</u>, <u>local conferences</u>, <u>excluding educational personnel K-16</u>, <u>whose category maximum is 100 percent or more of the Remuneration Factor; conference assistant treasurers/chief financial officers, conference assistant department directors, unordained ministers, Bible instructors, university and college presidents, major administrative officers and associates in administration, and senior academy principals. Qualifying individuals shall be those who routinely travel as part of their job function and are typically provided with a travel budget. Eligibility shall be determined by the employer.</u>
- b. <u>Eligible employees must carry the minimum coverage as specified in Y 29 15 2 and provide proof of coverage to their employer-, for a maximum of two cars per household.</u>
- 2. Educational Personnel K-16 Employees whose job requires less frequent use of their automobile are not eligible for automobile insurance assistance. Nevertheless, for their protection and the denominations' protection when their automobile is used in the course of employment, it is recommended that they maintain the same minimum level of bodily injury liability protection as required for employees receiving automobile insurance assistance.
 - <u>2.</u> <u>3.</u> a. Required Coverage—Those eligible for automobile insurance <u>assistance</u> as <u>listed</u> <u>outlined</u> in <u>paragraph</u> <u>section</u> 1 above shall be required to carry insurance with the following minimum limits when such limits are <u>readily</u> available:

*Bodily Injury Liability¹ \$250,000/500,000 *Property Damage \$100,000 50,000

Medical Payments³ 5,000
Comprehensive² **2100 Deductible
Collision² **28500 Deductible
Uninsured Motorist Statutory

b. In the event an employee mentioned in paragraph section 1- above has a claim, the first \$50 of the collision or comprehensive deductible will be paid by the employee and the remainder of the deductible will be paid by the employing organization. If and the employee or the insurer brings a liability claim against a third party and recovery is realized, reimbursement shall be made to the employing organization for any amounts previously paid by the employer above the first \$50 of the deductible amounts paid by the employee.

¹ Optional \$300,000 single limit is acceptable.

² Any deductible above or below this amount or waiver of the requirement to carry comprehensive and collision coverage is at the discretion of the employing organization.

³ Personal Protection Insurance (PIP) of at least \$5,000 may be substituted if Medical Payment insurance is unavailable or state law requires it.

3. 4. Deductible—Assistance (as calculated in c. below) may be granted on annual automobile insurance expense that exceeds 16.5 percent of the current monthly Remuneration Factor (rounded to the nearest dollar). Proof of payment and minimum insurance limits as in a. below is required. For qualified employees, deductible assistance will be granted on no more than two claims in a calendar year, whether comprehensive, collision, or a combination thereof. Comprehensive deductibles will be shared as follows:

-Employee: \$25.00 -Employer: \$75.00

9 <u>Collision deductibles will be shared as follows:</u>

10 <u>-Employee: \$50.00</u> 11 <u>-Employer: \$450.00</u>

Proof of payment from the insurance company on any claim must be presented to the employer to be eligible to receive deductible assistance.

<u>4.</u> 5. e. – Calculation The amount of assistance shall be determined by applying the appropriate factors to the average premiums of two insured automobiles owned by and used primarily by the employee and spouse. Premiums in excess of those typical of standard type cars shall not be considered.

- c. An unmarried denominational employee, if eligible, shall receive assistance on one automobile only. Married denominational employees, where both spouses are eligible for additional insurance, shall each receive assistance on one automobile only. The employer will determine the amount of assistance by calculating the combined average 6-month average premium cost of all its eligible employees at least once every two years (The employer may use the coverage documentation it has already on file from employees or collect the most current information from employees at the time the average is determined). This combined average will be used in the calculation of the reimbursement for the upcoming year. Once calculated, the eligible employee will be reimbursed the least of the following:
 - a. The average cost as determined by the employer if employee has one car
 - b. 160% of the average cost as determined by the employer if the employee has two cars
 - c. The actual premium paid by the employee if the employee has one car
 - d. 160% of the actual premium (100% of main car and 60% of secondary car) paid by the employee if the employee has two cars
- <u>5</u>. 4. Those organizations within the United States who prefer, may provide a flat allowance, based on the cost of insurance on a standard car, of their choosing. for automobile insurance assistance; Canadian organizations may provide reimbursement using the information above, on a per kilometer <u>basis</u>, or include it in the flat travel allowance where applicable.

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C 12 INTERDIVISION TRAVEL—POLICY AMENDMENT

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RECOMMENDED, To amend C 12 INTERDIVISION TRAVEL to read as follows:

C 12 Interdivision Travel

C 12 05 Travel by Employees Serving in the North American Division—1. Requests from Divisions—a. When the officers of an overseas division feel that the work in that division would be benefited by a visit from an employee in the North American Division, they shall inform the officers of the North American Division via the associate secretary Secretariat of the Division who shall take up the matter with the respective union conference officer (secretary) to determine if the employee is available and whether the visit would be in the best interest of the work.

- b. If the officers of the employing organization of the North American Division are willing to release the employee for a visit to the overseas division requesting his/her service, the union secretary will communicate their approval to the NAD associate secretary Secretariat utilizing the appropriate form, and authorization for the visit shall be by action of the North American Division Committee for Administration.
- 2. Requests Initiated by the North American Division—a. At times it is beneficial for an employee of the North American Division to be given the opportunity to visit another division. Such a visit can serve to broaden the vision of an employee and increase his/her understanding of the worldwide work of the Church. In such cases, the associate secretary Secretariat of the North American Division, on behalf of the division officers, shall inform the officers of the division in which the visit is to take place.
- b. If the officers of the division in which the visit is to take place are willing to arrange a visit, such approval will then be communicated to the North American Division Associate Secretary Secretariat.
- 3. *Planning the Visit*—a. Provision shall be made for employees to spend sufficient time in the field to enable them to make a real contribution to the work in the division.

C 48 10 OFFICIAL POSITION—POLICY AMENDMENT

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RECOMMENDED, To amend C 48 10 Official Position, to read as follows:

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C 48 10 Official Position—One of the North American Division's greatest assets resides in the diversity of the cultural, national, and ethnic origin of its membership. Its varied races, nationalities, and cultures have the potential to offer enrichment to each other as well as to the mission of the Church. They also bring the risk of misunderstandings and of possible injustice.

As a division with a multicultural heritage, the principle of unity within diversity is strongly promoted. This involves cherishing the differences among us while working toward a harmonious unification in the total life of the Church. Accordingly, the division affirms the following principles as a) those by which it will conduct the activities of the Church in its assigned territory; b) those to which its employees will ascribe; and c) those which it will encourage among its membership.

1. All members in regular standing will be given full and equal opportunity within the Church to develop the knowledge and skills needed in the building up of the Church, and all service and positions² of leadership on all levels of church activity will be open on the basis of qualifications without regard to race, color, gender, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap disability, age, height, weight, marital status (single, married, or widowed), financial status, or prior military service.

²The words "all service and positions" used in this statement refer to positions other than those requiring ordination to the ministry.

FB 20 CHILD PROTECTION AND VOLUNTEER SCREENING POLICIES FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH MINISTRIES—POLICY AMENDMENT

RECOMMENDED, To approve FB 20 Child Protection and volunteer Screening Policies for Children and Youth Ministries—Policy Amendment to read as follows:

FB 20 Child Protection and Volunteer Screening Policies for Children and Youth Ministries

- 1. *Objectives*—a. The Seventh-day Adventist Church has a moral and civil duty to protect the children and youth entrusted to its care. The local community also has an expectation that the church will provide a safe haven for children who participate in its ministries.
 - b. The church is committed to providing safe worship and educational environments to help children and youth learn to love and follow Jesus Christ.

"Church should be a safe place to bring our children. Everyone involved in work with children who are minors must meet all Church and legal standards and requirements." (*Church Manual*, Edition 18, pages 168-169.)

- c. Jesus placed a high value on the protection of children (Matthew 18:1-6); therefore, child protection is an essential element in all church-sponsored children's activities.
- d. All volunteers referenced in this section include all adults, over the age of 18, involved in any capacity in children's and youth ministries and activities, and all church ministry leaders and officers voted or appointed by the local church consistent with the *SDA Church Manual*; volunteers voted or appointed by the conference, union, or the North American Division and its affiliates, as well as all registered volunteers either from within or outside the North American Division voted or appointed to serve in the territory.
- 2. *Volunteer Selection and Management*—The work of volunteers is essential to the successful accomplishment of the Church's mission and ministry. The management policies and procedures employed to supervise the work of volunteers must be consistent with the mission of the church or school and must support its successful achievement.

- a. Selection and Screening of Volunteers
- 1) It is the responsibility of the local church and/or school to select, screen and manage trustworthy individuals to fill volunteer positions in ministry for children and youth activities.
- 2) In selecting individuals for volunteer positions, only persons who support the mission of the organization should be recruited.
- 3) The church shall adopt a practice that no adult will be considered for a volunteer leadership role in a church-sponsored ministry or activity until he/she has held membership in the congregation or has been known by the organization for a minimum of six (6) months.
- 4) All volunteers are required to participate in a screening procedure that will include a signed Volunteer Ministry Information Form, wherever possible, a criminal background check,

and it is recommended that there be three (3) character references, wherever possible. Individuals who submit incomplete forms will not be considered for a volunteer position.

- 5) Background screening should <u>must</u> be completed before the volunteer is allowed to serve.
- 6) All volunteer leaders, regardless of their previous experience, shall submit to the screening procedure provided by the church. The volunteer screening procedure should must be updated for each individual every three (3) years.
- 7) The local church or school is responsible for the cost of implementing these screening procedures. The local conference may provide financial assistance at their discretion.
- 8) It is the duty and responsibility of the church to maintain all volunteer information on a confidential basis at all times.
 - b. Supervision of Volunteers
- 1) Failure to comply with the established volunteer guidelines and code of conduct will result in the volunteer being asked to terminate participation in the ministry.
- 2) All allegations of inappropriate conduct involving a child or minor will be promptly reported in accordance with local child abuse reporting laws and investigated by the leadership of the church. The church will respect the rights of all parties involved in the alleged incident and treat all matters concerning the situation discreetly and confidentially.
- 3) Appropriate corrective action discipline, counsel, or removal from ministry will be taken when necessary.
 - c. Orientation and Training of Volunteers
- 1) Provide all volunteers with an understanding of the ministry's mission and the expectation the church has for its accomplishment in a safe and abuse-free manner.
- 2) Explain and provide in writing the expectations, code of conduct, and rules to be followed by volunteers in relation to supervision and interaction with children and youth. Reaffirm that alleged incidents of child abuse will be investigated and reported to authorities in accordance with local law.
- 3) All volunteers will be required to participate in educational courses on child abuse (physical and sexual) and the necessary steps to be taken to prevent the occurrence of child abuse incidents.
- 4) Training should include instructions on appropriate methods of physical contact to affirm children.
- 3. *Ministry to Sex Offenders within the Church*—The Church has a responsibility to provide worship opportunities and ministry to individuals who have previously engaged in inappropriate sexual conduct or physical abuse involving children or youth. When an offender wishes to be actively involved with the Church the following practices will be followed:
- a. The individual agrees to <u>not seek or hold church office</u>, and when participating in and <u>attending participate in and attend</u> adult Sabbath School, worship services, and other church related activities on a chaperoned basis and will not interact on a personal basis with any child under the age of eighteen (18).
- b. The individual will not be allowed alone in any building on church premises where activities involving children under the age of eighteen (18) are being conducted.
- c. If a child in the congregation approaches the individual on church premises or in public during a church sponsored activity the person will politely and immediately excuse themselves from the situation.

d. The local church pastor and elders will meet personally with the individual and enter into a five-year covenant agreement that outlines the expected conduct to be followed at all times while on church premises or while involved in a church sponsored activity. Compliance with the conditions outlined in the covenant agreement will be reviewed on a periodic basis and maybe renewed at the end of the five-year term. Inappropriate conduct or failure to comply with the terms of the covenant agreement may forfeit the individual's participation in church services or sponsored activities at any time.

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L 78 Ministers From Other Denominations

L 78 05 Practical Experience—When a minister from another denomination joins the Seventhday Adventist Church and desires to become a Seventh-day Adventist minister, the minister, before becoming involved in a formal study program, shall be expected to give evidence of stability in the message and demonstrate aptitude as a candidate for the Adventist ministry. The local Ministerial Secretary is responsible for assisting and encouraging the individual in the process of integrating into the life of the Adventist Church.

Following baptism into the Seventh-day Adventist Church, upon the recommendation of the ministerial secretary, and with the approval of the local conference and the union, the minister may be assigned full-time work in a local church under the supervision of an experienced pastor. Remuneration is to begin when the previous income ends. This program is to continue for a minimum of six months after which the minister will be evaluated under the direction of the conference ministerial secretary. An additional period of up to six months may be granted if, after review by the local conference, it is deemed necessary. Great care should be given to the selection of the pastor under whose direction the minister will work so that the most comprehensive and compassionate attention will be provided during this difficult transition period.

L 78 10 College/University Attendance—If the minister does not have the background for admittance to the SDA Theological Seminary at Andrews University, but has met the conditions outlined in L 30 78 05, the local and union conferences concerned shall develop a plan by which the minister may be enabled to attend a denominational college/university for a minimum of one school year so as to prepare for service in the Adventist ministry. Additional financial assistance beyond the one year of college/university shall be approved by the contributing organizations.

L 78 15 SDA Theological Seminary Attendance—If the minister has previous education sufficient to qualify for admittance to the SDA Theological Seminary at Andrews University, and has met the conditions outlined in L 30 78 05, the local and union conferences concerned shall develop a plan by which the minister may be enabled to take twelve months of study at the Seminary. The study program shall be so structured as to give special emphasis to Adventist doctrinal belief and practical instruction in the elements of pastoral and evangelistic ministries. Any extension of time at the Seminary beyond twelve months shall be recommended by the sending local conference and approved by the contributing organizations.

L 78 16 Chaplains from Another denomination—Adventist Chaplaincy Ministries shall develop a plan by which the converting chaplain will be supervised while completing ten (10) classes through the SDA Seminary Online Learning Center, an Adventist college (or the equivalent through distance learning or intensives offered by the *inMinistry* program) or independent/guided study. The study program shall be so structured or guided as to give special emphasis to Adventist doctrinal belief. Practical instruction in the elements of pastoral and evangelistic ministries relevant to the chaplain's field of ministry shall also be emphasized.

L 78 18 NADEI Attendance—If the minister can best be prepared for ministry by attending the North American Division Evangelism Institute and has met the conditions outlined in L 30 78 05

39 and L 30 78 15, the local and union conferences concerned shall develop a plan enabling the 40

individual to attend the Institute for a period of up to nine months. The maximum allotted time of 41

nine months would allow the individual to take all courses offered by the Institute. The director 42 43

of NADEI shall, after the minister's completion of the program, provide a written evaluation to

the sponsoring conference. 44
